The Benefits of Municipal Ownership of Your Public Utility

More and more, with the passage of the years, should the citizens of Houlton become aware of the extent of the debt they owe to those far-sighted and public spirited citizens of half a century ago whose enterprise made it possible for the town to acquire full ownership of the three public utility departments that are included under the name of the Houlton Water Company.

It is appropriate, on the occasion of the observance of the 150th birthday of this community, that we acknowledge that debt and try, partially, to estimate its dimensions in terms of the dollars the municipally owned Houlton Water Company has earned for users of its services over the years as well as the indirect benefits that have accrued from it to every taxpayer.

The return arises from two main sources. First, of course, is the annual dividend which the company pays each year, out of its earnings, into the treasury of the town. This has the effect of lowering taxes by making it unnecessary to raise a like amount of money by taxation. Second source of financial benefit comes from the lower rate structure users of electricity are obliged to pay because their utility services are publicly and not privately owned. A third and more indirect benefit is that derived from increased and improved services and equipment that is provided and paid for out of earnings that do not have to go into stock dividends, with a corresponding appreciation in capital growth and capital value.
