



Next occupants of the pastorate here was Rev. and Mrs. Eugene Allen. The minister was overtaken by a serious illness in the summer of 1932. When the conference was held the following year, he was placed on the retired roll. His son, Eugene, joined the conference at that time and has since served in some larger

Rev. Herman Grant, later to serve in Presque Isle, and who was transferred to the Patten parish at the 1957 conference, came to Houlton in the fall of 1932 and completed the conference year as a supply pastor.

In 1933 Rev. and Mrs. A. G Christopher were transferred to the Houlton pastorate and, two years later, in 1935, Houlton entertained the conference for the third time in its history. Rev. Christopher took full charge of this program which turned out to be unusually successful.

SEVEN YEARS HERE


During his seven years in Houlton he took a keen interest in town affairs, was an active member of the Houlton Rotary club as well as other groups in the community. It was at the close of this tenancy that the 100th anniversary of the church was observed with fitting services, which included a cake with 100 candles.

Rev. and Mrs. Royal Brown came to the Houlton church in 1940 to hold a pastorate here longer than any other previous minister of the church. He remained here until 1950 and during those years this popular couple made an indelible impression on the community. Both were very active in local affairs. Mrs. Brown was president of the Aroostook Free Bed and Aid Association, both were active in the Order of the Eastern Star and the pastor was a member of the Rotary Club for all of his years

ALSO GRANGE CHAPLAIN

While he held his office here he was also chaplain of the Maine State Grange. He was transferred from Houlton to Gardiner and has since retired from the active ministry, serving occasionally in a supply capacity. During the last year of Rev. Brown's occupancy of the Methodist pulpit, the parish was chosen again to entertain the church conference for the fourth time in its history.

It was in the summer of 1949, also, that the decision finally came to stop talking about building an addition to the church, and start to work on it. When the
